Mountainview High School is an exciting and thriving Year 9 to Year 13 co-educational secondary school located in Timaru, central South Island, New Zealand.

Whilst we have a history that goes back more than 100 years we have only been on the current school site since the mid 1980s.

This relocation presented us with the rare opportunity to redevelop the school completely, making the most of modern learning environments and embracing new technologies, such as Digital Learning.

We place our students at the heart of every decision we make. This allows us to respond to the needs of our community in engaging and innovative ways. Our learning programmes are tailored to provide our students with the best chance of academic, sporting, cultural, and personal success.

We have excellent teachers, superb learning spaces, and a picturesque environment that is the envy of most schools in the country. Our Curriculum

Junior School - Year 9-10

At Junior level, students take 5 compulsory core subjects - Mathematics, English, Science, Social Studies, and Physical Education. Classes are made up entirely of either Year 9 or Year 10 students and taught by specialist subject teachers.

Students then choose 3 additional subjects that they select from the other curriculum areas including Visual and Performing Arts, Technology

and Languages. Classes are made up of both Year 9 and 10 students (mixed), with activities / projects differentiated and scaffolded.

Senior School - Year 11-13

At senior level, students select 6 subjects, which they attend 3 times per week. At Year 11, English or Te Reo Maori, Maths and Health are compulsory subjects. At Year 13, subjects can be University Approved subjects and at Scholarship level.

Sporting Opportunities

Facilities

Whānau system

On enrolment at Mountainview High School each student is welcomed into one of our Whānau (Moana, Hiwi, or Whenua). This Whānau will be your central hub for the entire time you are at school. In NZ Whanau means family.

There is a great deal of rivalry between the three Whānau within the school, and each year they compete across a range of sporting, academic, and cultural activities, for the Preen's Shield. Our Whānau system also provides a foundation for our education and wellbeing platforms (Ako).



Uniform

Mountainview High School has an expectation that all students will wear our school uniform. This promotes a sense of identity and belonging amongst the students and fosters a feeling of fellowship. Everyone wears the same attire, creating an environment where individuals are judged based on their character, skills, and achievements rather than their appearance or clothing.





| Our Values - Te Awa

Braided rivers are quite rare and Aotearoa has a number of them. Rivers flow from the mountains to the sea and our values flow, from our kura to our community. Each braid represents a different value, separate but weaving between each other as they make their way to the sea.

Whanaungatanga

Whanaungatanga means relationships, kinship, a sense of family connection, building trust and long lasting bonds. It is a relationship through shared experiences and working together which provides people with a sense of belonging. It develops as a result of kinship rights and obligations, which also serve to strengthen each member of the kin group. It also extends to others to whom one develops a close familial, friendship or reciprocal relationship. Through developing Whanaungatanga, young people are nurtured in the community, so they can contribute strongly in society. It is fundamental to tuakana teina, which is reciprocal or shared learning.

Ehara taku toa i te toa takitahi. Engari, he toa takitini.

Success is not the work of one, but the work of many.

Manaakitanga

Manaakitanga means hospitality, kindness, generosity and support. It is the process of showing respect and caring for others. Hospitality is a value that if done well can have a long lasting effect. It is also the natural etiquette of care and compassion and for treating others as you would like them to treat you.

He aroha whakatō, he aroha puta mai.

If kindness is shown then kindness you shall receive.

Kaitiakitanga

Kaitiakitanga means guardianship and protection. It is a way of managing the environment, based on the Māori world view. Kaitiaki is a guardian. This can be a person or a group that cares for an area such as a lake or forest. Kaitiakitanga is about caring for the environment and also taking care of others, through guardianship. It is also about self care and taking care of oneself.

Whatungarongaro te tangata toitū te whenua.

As people disappear from sight, the land remains.

Rangatiratanga

Rangatiratanga means chieftainship, the right to exercise authority, chiefly autonomy and authority, leadership of a social group, sovereignty, self determination and self management. Rangatiratanga is about being determined, open minded, reflective and committed. It can be demonstrated by the tuakana (seniors) leading by example to the teina (juniors), through role modelling the expected behaviours of the kura (school).

Ko te amorangi ki mua, te hāpai ō ki muri.

Leadership to the fore, we all have important roles to play.

Pūkengatanga

Pūkengatanga is about striving for the pursuit of excellence in everything that we do. It is about giving value to all backgrounds, prior experiences and skills. Pūkengatanga is about being open to learning, being prepared and dedicated to achieving goals and objectives.

Puraho maku, kei ngaure o mahi.

Timaru - New Zealand

From sandy beaches through to native bush and mountain tops, the Timaru District is the perfect place to explore.

Timaru is a port city in the southern Canterbury Region of New Zealand, located 157 km (98 mi) southwest of Christchurch and about 196 km (122 mi) northeast of Dunedin on the eastern Pacific coast of the South Island. The Timaru urban area is home to 28,600 people, and is the largest urban area in South Canterbury, and the second largest in the Canterbury Region overall, after Christchurch. The town is the seat of the Timaru District, which includes the surrounding rural area and the towns of Geraldine, Pleasant Point and Temuka, which combined have a total population of 48,500.

Caroline Bay beach is a popular recreational area located close to Timaru's main centre, just to the north of the substantial port facilities. Beyond Caroline Bay, the industrial suburb of Washdyke is at a major junction with State Highway 8, the main

route into the Mackenzie Country. This provides a road link to Pleasant Point, Fairlie, Twizel, Lake Tekapo, Aoraki / Mount Cook and Queenstown.

Timaru has been built on rolling hills created from the lava flows of the extinct Mt Horrible volcano, which last erupted thousands of years ago. The result is that most of the main streets are undulating, a clear contrast with the flat landscape of the Canterbury Plains to the north. This volcanic rock is used for the construction of local "bluestone" buildings.
